1.1 • WATER DEPARTMENT PUBLIC HEALTH GOALS REPORT 2010-12

Water Resources Director Jim Glancy made a presentation based on the memo in the agenda and stated that State and Federal contaminant level goals required the preparation of a Public Health Goals Compliance Report every three years. He reported that thousands of tests were performed each year for 180 constituents and that only two constituents were above recommended goal levels. He noted that these were rather utopian goals, as the goal levels were significantly lower than any currently available laboratory technology to detect them. He also noted that having test disclose a constituent level above either the State Public Health Goal (PHG) or the Federal Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) did not mean that the Department was in violation of State or Federal drinking water standards. It was the recommendation of the Water Resources Committee that the City Council hold a public hearing and adopt the Public Health Goals Compliance Report 2010-2012.

1.1 • WATER DEPARTMENT PUBLIC HEALTH GOALS REPORT 2010-12 - Cont.

Mayor Croft confirmed from Mr. Glancy that the Goal levels were so low as to be not realistic, since they preceded the science necessary to be able to test for them.

Mayor Croft opened the public hearing at 7:47 p.m. and called for anyone in the audience wishing to address the City Council on this matter. There was no response.

1.2 • REPORT OF DELINQUENT FEES FOR GARBAGE, WASTE AND REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Administrative Services Director Diane Perkin made a presentation based on the report in the agenda and stated 444 notices had been mailed to property owners with delinquent charges pending for garbage, waste and refuse collection. She advised that as of close of business this day, 250 accounts remained delinquent and that payments would continue to be accepted until July 31st. It was the recommendation of staff that the City Council adopt the proposed resolution confirming the report of delinquent fees. There was no response.

Renewal of Agreement for Reimbursement for Fingerprint Identification

Specialists

INTRODUCTION:

Since December 2004, the City has had an agreement with the City of Cerritos to provide resources for fingerprint identification from crime scenes. Cerritos hires Fingerprint Identification Specialists (FIS) who process fingerprints collected at crime scenes by our latent print trained community service officers. This program offers crime lab analysis and crime pattern identification on a regional basis in a very timely manner.

STATEMENT OF FACTS:

Since implementing this program, we have experienced more and more demand for these services from our residents, deputies and detectives. Since we entered into the agreement, we have received over 7,200 requests for prints, completed nearly 4,000 investigations, obtained evidence in nearly 2,500 cases, resulting in almost 550 positive identifications. Since there is a good chance that these criminals are responsible for many more crimes than the single incident in which they were identified, deputies acknowledge this program has a very positive impact in keeping crime low in Lakewood.

For the last three years, our contract has provided reimbursement for up to 1,200 hours per year of Fingerprint Identification Specialist services at a cost of \$41.25 per hour. Cases that are "cold" or do not need immediate processing will be sent to the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department crime lab, which provides excellent service but because of their volume of cases, takes longer to get results.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is the recommendation of staff that the City Council renew a three-year Agreement with the City of Cerritos, effective through June 30, 2016, for Fingerprint Identification Specialist services at a cost of \$41.25 per hour for up to 1,200 hours per year.

Approval of the Agreements for Median Landscape Maintenance and Mowing

Services of City Facilities with TruGreen LandCare

INTRODUCTION

TruGreen LandCare is the current provider of maintenance of the City's contracted landscaped medians on Bloomfield Avenue, Pioneer Boulevard, Centralia Street, and Del Amo Boulevard. TruGreen LandCare also provides contracted mowing services of the large open turf areas at the City's Water Yard and at 12 City Parks.

STATEMENT OF FACT

TruGreen LandCare, formerly Landscape West, has performed mowing services since the original agreement was approved in 1990. In August 2004, TruGreen LandCare acquired U.S. Landscapes, Inc. U.S. Landscapes, Inc. had the original medians contract on Bloomfield Avenue and Pioneer Boulevard. Since that acquisition, TruGreen LandCare has performed contract services to date. In 2007, the Centralia Street and Del Amo Boulevard medians were added to the contract. Staff is pleased with the current work performed by TruGreen LandCare on our medians, at the Water Yard, and on our parks. TruGreen LandCare has agreed to keep billing at the same price as the last fiscal year. Costs will be \$45,498.24 on our median landscape maintenance and \$40,713.12 for mowing services of City facilities for FY 2013-2014.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council:

- 1) Approve the agreements for contract services of our landscaped medians and facilities mowing with TruGreen LandCare for the new fiscal year.
- 2) Authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to sign the agreement for median landscape maintenance at an annual cost of \$45,498.24 and mowing services of City facilities at an annual cost of \$40,713.12 in forms approved by the City Attorney.

Adoption of the Accumulation Program for Part-Time and Limited-Service

Employees (APPLE) Plan

INTRODUCTION

Resolution No. 96-47 established a FICA alternative plan to part-time and temporary employees. The City currently provides a FICA alternative plan to part-time and temporary employees of the Employer through Public Agency Retirement Services (PARS) Plan and Trust.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The City desires to continue in providing a tax-qualified FICA alternative plan to part-time and temporary employees through a different plan option provided by Keenan & Associates called the Accumulation Program for Part-Time and Limited-Service Employees, or APPLE plan.

Staff has reviewed the APPLE plan and determined that it will provide additional benefits to the City's part-time and temporary employees. These benefits include streamlined benefit payment processing, no withdrawal fee, principal guarantee, and greater access to account information via the web and by mail. Additionally, the plan is a 457 plan which provides greater benefits to employees over the current 401a plan in fewer fees and greater flexibility.

All funds currently held on account in the current alternative to social security plan will be transferred to APPLE and the new plan will retain the current contribution rates of 1.8 percent for the employer and 6.2 percent for the employee.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Lakewood City Council approve the proposed Resolution, which includes:

- 1. Adopting the Accumulation Program for Part-Time and Limited-Service Employees, APPLE plan, effective September 1, 2013.
- 2. Contracting with Keenan & Associates to provide ongoing administrative consulting services in connection with the operation of the APPLE Plan; to arrange funding of the Plan through American United Life (AUL).
- 3. Authorizing MidAmerica Administrative and Retirement Solutions to act as third party claims administrator for the APPLE plan.

- 4. Authorizing MidAmerica and/or Keenan & Associates to execute, on behalf of the City, the APPLE Plan and any other documents necessary to carry out the provisions of the APPLE Plan.
- 5. Authorizing the City Manager or the Director of Administrative Services to execute such documents and to take such action as may be necessary for the proper implementation and operation of the APPLE Plan.

RESOLUTION NO. 2013-32

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAKEWOOD ADOPTING THE ACCUMULATION PROGRAM FOR PART-TIME AND LIMITED-SERVICE EMPLOYEES (APPLE PLAN) OF THE CITY OF LAKEWOOD

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 53216, et seq., authorizes a governmental employer to establish and fund a pension Plan covering its employees on a compulsory basis; AND

WHEREAS, Section 11332 of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation ACT of 1990 ("OBRA '90") extends Social Security retirement benefit coverage to employees of state and local governments who are not covered by a state or local retirement system and subjects the employer and employee to Federal Insurance Contributions Act ("FICA") taxes on the employee's wages; and

WHEREAS, OBRA '90 excludes from the requirement of Social Security coverage governmental employees who are covered by a compulsory retirement system of a state or local government; and

WHEREAS, the City of Lakewood ("City") currently provides a FICA alternative plan to part-time and temporary employees of the Employer through Public Agency Retirement Services (PARS) Plan and Trust; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to continue in providing a tax-qualified FICA alternative plan for said employees, but to replace the existing PARS Plan and Trust with the Accumulation Program for Part-Time and Limited-Service Employees of the City of Lakewood ("APPLE Plan");

WHEREAS, the Council has reviewed and elected to adopt the Accumulation Program for Part-Time and Limited-Service Employees (APPLE) to cover the City's part-time and temporary employees.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAKEWOOD DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Pursuant to the City's authority under the existing PARS Plan to amend the plan, the Council does hereby adopt the Accumulation Program for Part-Time and Limited-Service Employees of the City of Lakewood as an amendment to the existing PARS Plan, replacing the PARS Plan in full effective September 1, 2013.

SECTION 2. The Council hereby designates the Director of Administrative Services as the Plan Administrator of the APPLE Plan, and appoints the City as Trustee of the APPLE Plan.

SECTION 3. Keenan & Associates will act as Broker for American United Life Insurance Company's 3121 Alternative to Social Security program, and provide consultant and broker services for the APPLE Plan as outlined in the Keenan & Associates Service Agreement.

SECTION 4. The Council directs the transfer of the plan assets held by U.S. Bank under the Public Agency Retirement Services (PARS) Plan and Trust to AUL, as custodian for the successor Trustee, the City of Lakewood for the benefit of the City of Lakewood APPLE Plan, to occur within 30 days after September 1, 2013, or a date mutually agreed upon by PARS and the City of Lakewood. This will facilitate the ability of MidAmerica to process Plan distributions with minimal delays to Plan Participants.

SECTION 5. The Council directs the transfer of plan participant's account information from Public Agency Retirement Services (PARS) to MidAmerica, to occur within 30 days after September 1, 2013 or a date mutually agreed upon by PARS and the City of Lakewood in order for MidAmerica to process Plan distribution with minimal delays.

SECTION 6. The City hereby terminates the City's participation in the PARS Trust and removes US Bank of California the Trustee of the Plan.

SECTION 7. The Council hereby removes Public Agency Retirement Services (PARS) as Trust Administrator and appoints MidAmerica as Third Party Administrator of the APPLE Plan.

SECTION 8. The Council authorizes MidAmerica and/or Keenan & Associates to execute, on behalf of the Employer, the APPLE Plan and any other documents necessary to carry out the provisions of the APPLE Plan; to contract with Keenan & Associates to provide ongoing administrative consulting services in connection with the operation of the APPLE Plan; to arrange funding of the Plan through American United Life (AUL).

SECTION 9.

- I. That, pursuant to Code section 414(h) (2), the Employer will continue to "pick up" employee contributions to the APPLE Plan on behalf of Plan participants. "Employee Contributions" shall mean those contributions to the APPLE Plan, which are deducted from the salary of employees and are credited to individual employees' accounts.
- II. That the contributions made by the Employer to the APPLE Plan, although designated as employee contributions, will be paid by the Employer in lieu of contributions by the employees who are participants in the APPLE Plan.
- III. That employees shall not have the option of choosing to receive the contributed amounts directly instead of having them paid by the Employer to the APPLE Plan.
- IV. That the Employer shall pay to the APPLE Plan the contributions designated as employee contributions from the same source of funds as used in paying salary.

V. That the amount of the contributions designated as employee contributions and paid by the Employer to the APPLE Plan on behalf of an employee shall be the entire contributions required of the employee under the Plan.

SECTION 10. That the City Manager and Director of Administrative Services are hereby authorized, empowered and directed, in the name and on behalf of the Employer, to execute such documents and instruments and to take all such other and further actions as may be necessary or appropriate to carry out the purpose and the intent of the foregoing resolutions.

Effective January 1, 1996, the California Government Code, Section 53646 requires that:

"The treasurer or chief fiscal officer shall render a quarterly report to the chief executive officer, the internal auditor and the legislative body of the local agency. The quarterly report shall be so submitted within 30 days following the end of the quarter covered by the report."

In compliance with this section of the code, the schedule of investments is being rendered to be received and filed.

STATEMENT OF FACT

The investments represented in this report are allocated to a variety of funds such as the General Fund, Water Fund, Redevelopment Funds, Restricted Special Revenue Funds, and Fiduciary Funds.

The City's idle funds are invested in compliance with the City's investment policy, which was last reviewed and approved in January 2012 by the City Council, and is compliance with the updated Investment Policy proposed for adoption. Specifically, the city's investment objectives in the investment of public funds are safety, liquidity and yield. To accomplish these objectives, the following types of investments have been chosen and the City is currently or in the past invested in the following securities:

Treasury Notes

TREAS Obligations of the U.S. Government to provide for the cash flow needs of the Federal Government.

Federal Agency Bonds or Notes:

Federal agency or United States government-sponsored enterprise obligations, participations, or other instruments, including those issued by or fully guaranteed as to principal and interest by federal agencies or United States government-sponsored enterprises.

FHLB (Federal Home Loan Bank Bonds)

Bonds and discount notes issued by the Federal Home Loan Bank to provide funding to member institutions and make available money to the residential mortgage market.

FHLMC (Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp)

A publicly chartered agency that buys qualifying residential mortgages from lenders, packages them into new securities backed by those pooled mortgages, provides certain guarantees and then re-sells the securities on the open market.

FNMA (Federal National Mortgage Association)

National Mortgage Association is a government-sponsored, privately owned corporation established to create a secondary market for Federal Housing Administration mortgages.

FFCB (Federal Farm Credit Bank)

The Federal Farm Credit Bank is an independent agency of the U.S. Government which issues bonds and discount notes to provide short- and long-term credit and credit-related services to farmers, ranchers, rural homeowners, producers and harvesters.

Negotiable Certificates of Deposit

Negotiable CDs are issued by large banks and are freely traded in secondary markets as short term (2 to 52 weeks), large denomination (\$100,000 minimum) CD, that is either issued at a discount on its par value, or at a fixed interest rate payable at maturity.

Municipal Bonds or Notes:

Registered treasury notes or bonds of any of the other 49 United States in addition to California, including bonds payable solely out of the revenues from a revenue-producing property owned, controlled, or operated by a state or by a department, board, agency, or authority of any of the other 49 United States, in addition to California.

Corporate Notes:

Medium-term notes, defined as all corporate and depository institution debt securities with a maximum remaining maturity of five years of less, issued by corporations organized and operating within the Unites States or by depository institutions licensed by the United States, or any state and operating within the United States. Medium-term corporate notes shall be rated in a rating category of "A" or its equivalent or better.

Commercial Paper:

Commercial paper of "prime" quality of the highest ranking or of the highest letter and number rating as provided for by a nationally recognized statistical-rating organization.

Pooled Funds:

LAIF (Local Agency Investment Fund, State of California)

This investment pool is administered by the Treasurer of the State of California, and provides a high-level of liquidity and strong safety through diversification of investments.

CAMP (California Asset Management Program)

A Joint Powers Authority established in 1989 by the treasurers and finance directors of several California public agencies to provide professional investment services at a reasonable cost. Participation is limited to California public agencies.

Los Angeles County Pool

Investment in the Los Angeles County Pool may not exceed the current pool limits and should be reviewed periodically.

MMKT (Money Market)

This is a money market interest-bearing checking account that is fully insured and collateralized.





STATEMENT OF FACT

A request for disabled person parking was received from the resident at 4914 Hersholt Avenue stating that she and her mother have disabled person placards, she can no longer maneuver her mother and wheelchair into a vehicle parked on the driveway, and neighbors park in front of her home forcing her to park elsewhere. Her requests for neighbor cooperation have not been successful.

Staff verified the placards for this address. A site visit revealed the garage is at the front of the property with a slightly slanted driveway and a fence surrounds the front yard. This location was monitored to find that parking was available most of the time staff visited the site and vehicles parked on the street appeared to be residents of the neighborhood. The requestor is aware that anyone in possession of a disabled person parking placard would be able to park in the requested restricted area. The location is shown on the attached map.


RECOMMENDATION

No vehicle shall stop, stand or park in said parking restriction unless displaying a special identification license plate or placard issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles pursuant to Section 22511.55 of the California Vehicle Code.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall be effective as long as said restriction is painted and posted in accordance with the requirements of Vehicle Code Section 22511.7 of the California Vehicle Code. In addition, this resolution shall be in effect only as long as Diane Markoff, a physically disabled person, occupies the home at 4914 Hersholt Avenue.

INTRODUCTION

Over the past several months, staff has been preparing the draft 2013-2021 Housing Element as required by State law. The Housing Element is an official policy statement with regards to the types and quantities of housing to be provided in the City of Lakewood. The Housing Element analyzes existing housing conditions and identifies opportunities for improving and expanding Lakewood's housing stock through 2021.

The draft 2013-2021 Housing Element of the General Plan is a revision of the City's Housing Element adopted in 1990 and later updated in 1994, 2002, and in 2010 in compliance with State Housing Element law. This update to the Housing Element has been prepared pursuant to State law and the Streamline Update Guidance procedures as provided by the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD). This process has included public workshops and presentations to the Planning and Environment Commission and the City Council. A draft of the 2013-2021 Housing Element was sent to HCD for review and comment. Staff has addressed HCD requests for clarifications and comments. HCD received the draft Housing Element on May 1, 2013 and on June 14, 2013, HCD recommended approval of the document. On July 2, 2013, the draft Housing Element was presented to the Planning and Environment Commission at a public hearing. Following the hearing the Planning and Environment Commission adopted Resolution 14-2013 recommending the City Council approve of General Plan Amendment No. 2013-1, thereby approving the draft 2013-2021 Housing Element.

STATEMENT OF FACT

HCD reports that draft 2013-2021 Housing Element meets the statutory requirements of State housing law and that to remain on an eight-year planning cycle, the draft 2013-2021 Housing Element should be adopted by the statutory due date of October 15, 2013.

The primary purpose and intent of the Housing Element is to: (1) provide a framework for responding to local housing needs, and local share of regionally identified housing needs, and (2) fulfill the statutory and regulatory requirements of State law. The draft Housing Element contains the following, in compliance with State law:

- □ A review of housing needs and resources including identification of existing, future and special housing needs, and energy conservation opportunities (see Sections 3 and 4).
- A review of governmental and non-governmental constraints to the production of housing (see Section 5).
- A review and evaluation of the City's success in achieving the 2010 Housing Element's goals and objectives, and in carrying out Housing Element programs (see Section 6).
- □ Identification of housing goals, policies and objectives toward meeting existing and future housing needs (see Section 7).
- □ Identification of new and on-going housing programs necessary for the achievement of the goals, policies, and objectives identified in the Element (see Section 8).

<u>Citizen Participation.</u> As required by State Law (Government Code Section 65588(c), all economic segments of the community must be provided an opportunity to review and comment on the Housing Element. In compliance with this requirement, community meetings and public workshops for the draft 2013-2021 Housing Element were held on the following dates:

Tuesday, March 12, 2013	Joint meeting of the City Council and the Planning and Environment Commission.
Wednesday, March 27, 2013	Community Meeting #1, Executive Board Room, Centre at Sycamore Plaza, 5 pm - 6 pm.
Thursday, April 4, 2013	Housing Element Workshop with Planning and Environment Commission.
Thursday, May 16, 2013	Community Meeting #2, Palms Park, 5 pm - 6 pm.
Tuesday, July 2, 2013	Public Hearing with the Planning and Environment Commission.
Tuesday, August 13, 2013	Public Hearing with the City Council.

Notification of the community meetings were mailed to housing advocates, developers, and other organizations, and published in the Press Telegram. Notices were also posted at City Hall, at public parks, and on the City's website (www.lakewoodcity.org). Copies of the draft 2013-2021 Housing Element were made available for review at Lakewood City Hall. Appendix A in the Housing includes public notices for Lakewood Housing Element community meetings and copies of comments received on the Draft Housing Element and responses to those comments where appropriate.

<u>California Environmental Quality Act.</u> An Initial Study has been prepared for the draft 2013-2021 Housing Element, pursuant to Section 15063 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines, as amended, and circulated to the public for review for 30 days. The Negative Declaration finds that the adoption of the draft 2013-2021 Housing Element will not have a significant impact on the environment.

Thank you for submitting the City of Lakewood's draft housing element update received for review on May 1, 2013. Pursuant to Government Code Section 65585(b), the Department is reporting the results of its review.

The Department conducted a streamlined review of the draft housing element based on the City meeting all eligibility criteria detailed in the Department's Housing Element Update Guidance. The City also used SCAG's pre-approved housing element data.

The revised draft element meets the statutory requirements of State housing element law. The City must monitor and report on the results of all programs through the annual progress report, required pursuant to Government Code Section 65400. The element will comply with State housing element law (Article 10.6 of the Government Code) when adopted and submitted to the Department, pursuant to Government Code Section 65585(g).

To remain on an eight year planning cycle, pursuant to Senate Bill 375 (Chapter 728, Statutes of 2008) the City must adopt its housing element within 120 calendar days from the statutory due date of October 15, 2013 for SCAG localities. If adopted after this date, the City will be required to revise the housing element every four years until adopting at least two consecutive revisions by the statutory deadline (Government Code Section 65588(e)(4)). Description of the Proposed Project:

The purpose of the 2013-2021 Housing Element is to provide suitable housing for all residents of Lakewood regardless of income, age, race, religion, gender or ethnic background. This Housing Element sets forth the City's 2013-2021 strategy to address the community's housing needs. It includes the preservation and improvement of the community's residential character, the expansion of housing opportunities for all economic segments of the community, and the provision of guidance and direction for local government decision-making on all matters relating to housing. As required by State law, the City of Lakewood has identified programs in this Housing Element to meet its "fair share" of the existing and future housing needs. According to the Southern California Association of Governments, Regional Housing Needs Assessment, there is a need for an additional 403 units in the City between 2013 and 2021.

The Initial Study reflects the independent judgment of the City.

I declare that I have examined the plans for the above-captioned project as submitted by the applicant, and on the basis of the "Assessment of Environmental Impact Questionnaire" on file in my office as a public document, it is my opinion that this project will have no significant impact upon the environment within the meaning of the California Environmental Quality Act of 1970, as amended. Further, the project site is not on any list enumerated under Section 65962.5 of the California Government Code.

WHEREAS, the City Council has heretofore adopted the General Plan of Land Use, including a Housing Element, Circulation, Conservation, Open Space, Noise, Safety, Recreation and Community Services, Air Quality, and Economic Development, containing a statement of population density and building intensity, by Resolution No. 96-90; and

WHEREAS, the State Legislature in 1984 by Chapter 1691 added Article 10.6, entitled "Housing Elements", commencing with Section 65583 of the Government Code pertaining to the contents of the Housing Element, determination by each locality of its share of regional housing needs, and including guidelines in the preparation and amendment of Housing Elements and provisions for its review and revision; and

WHEREAS, the City prepared and submitted a 2013-2021 Housing Element to the State Department of Housing and Community Development on May 1, 2013 for review pursuant to Section 65585(b) of the Government Code; and

WHEREAS, the State Department of Housing and Community Development has presented its comments and suggestions on the 2013-2021 Housing Element to the City, and said comments and suggestions were thereafter incorporated into the 2013-2021 Housing Element; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the terms and provisions of Section 65583 of the Government Code said 2013-2021 Housing Element has been reviewed by the Planning and Environment Commission following a public hearing on July 2, 2013; and

WHEREAS, in connection with its study of the 2013-2021 Housing Element, the Planning and Environment Commission considered the potential environmental impacts of said project, and on July 2, 2013 concluded a negative declaration for this general plan amendment should be issued; and

WHEREAS, the Planning and Environment Commission on July 2, 2013 adopted Resolution 14-2013 recommending approval of the Housing Element to the City Council, and that the City Council following a public hearing adopt the 2013-2021 Housing Element; and

WHEREAS, after due notice of the time and place thereof given in the time and manner required by law, a public hearing was held before the City Council of the City of Lakewood on August 13, 2013 on the 2013-2021 Housing Element, at which time said 2013-2021 Housing Element was displayed and presented; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered said 2013-2021 Housing Element and all comments pertaining thereto, finds there have been no significant changes in said project requiring further environment impact studies or reports, and that the 2013-2021 Housing Element should be approved subject to any changes the City Council should insert in this Resolution.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Lakewood does resolve as follows:

SECTION 1. The City Council finds that the aforementioned recitations are true and correct and that the General Plan of the City of Lakewood is hereby amended as provided in this Resolution.

SECTION 2. Resolution No. 96-90, entitled "A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Lakewood, California, Adopting a Comprehensive, Long-Term General Plan, November 1996, including a Land Use Element, Circulation Element, a Conservation Element, an Open Space Element, a Noise Element, a Safety Element, a Recreation and Community Service Element, an Air Quality Element, an Economic Development Element superseding and replacing the previously adopted General Plan, 1990, except the Housing Element thereof, which is reaffirmed as part of the City's Comprehensive General Plan, November 1996" is hereby amended by adopting that certain document and report on file in the Office of the City Clerk, and entitled "2013-2021 Housing Element "being the Housing Element of the General Plan for the City of Lakewood. Further, staff is hereby authorized to make minor modifications to the 2013-2021 Housing Element in response to comments from the State Department of Housing and Community Development, provided said modifications do not affect or contradict policies and programs adopted by the City Council.

SECTION 3. The City Council finds the 2013-2021 Housing Element has been adopted in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Government Code of the State of California, and after consideration and review by both the Planning and Environment Commission and the Department of Housing and Community Development. The City Council further finds the review by the Planning and Environment Commission of the recommendations of the Department of Housing and Community Development, and the incorporation in the 2013-2021 Housing Element of said recommendations is reasonable and should be approved.

SECTION 4. The Planning and Environment Commission is further directed to comply with the terms and provisions of Article 10.6 entitled "Housing Element" of the Government Code, commencing with Section 65583, including the review and revision provisions thereof contained in Section 65588, and report to the City Council from time to time pertaining to its progress in this regard.

SECTION 5. In connection with this project, the City Council has considered the proposed negative declaration and the comments received during the public review process. The City Council finds on the basis of the initial study and the comments received during the review period and at the public hearing, that there is no substantial evidence that the project will have a significant effect on the environment. Based on these findings, the City Council approves a negative declaration for this project.

SUBJECT: Congestion Management Program (CMP) Conformance Self-Certification Process

STATEMENT OF FACTS

The Congestion Management Program is a required program that was created by the State Legislature with the passage of Assembly Bill 471 (1989), which became effective with voter approval of Proposition 111 in June 1990. The Congestion Management Program for Los Angeles County was developed by the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority ("MTA") and delivered to the cities in May 1992. The City of Lakewood has been complying with the requirements of the CMP since its implementation.

In September 2008, MTA Board of Directors approved the Congestion Mitigation Fee Feasibility Study to confirm the growth forecast and estimate project costs that could be the basis of a possible congestion mitigation fee program. The study has been completed and on June 27, 2013, the MTA Board of Directors approved a motion that directed MTA staff to work with their Sacramento delegation to explore legislative options to the state-mandated CMP. MTA staff will report back to the MTA Board of Directors no later than February, 2014, with their findings and recommendations for meeting CMP requirements. In the meanwhile, the existing local implementation responsibilities for the CMP will be in effect.

The 2010 Congestion Management Program adopted on October 28, 2010 requires that annually local jurisdictions submit:

- 1. A Local Development Report showing the development activity in the city from June 1, 2012 to May 31, 2013.
- 2. A resolution approved by the City Council at a noticed public hearing adopting the Local Implementation Report and self-certifying the City's conformance with local CMP requirements.

The City is in compliance with all local CMP requirements. A Land Use Resolution was adopted by the City Council on February 9, 1993. A Transportation Demand Management (TDM) ordinance was adopted by the City Council on February 23, 1993. The City continues to conduct semi-annual traffic counts on Lakewood Boulevard. Development activities are also being tracked and are the basis for the attached Local Development Report.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF LAKEWOOD, CALIFORNIA, FINDING THE CITY TO BE IN CONFORMANCE WITH THE CONGESTION MANAGEMENT PROGRAM (CMP) AND ADOPTING THE CMP LOCAL DEVELOPMENT REPORT, IN ACCORDANCE WITH CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 65089

WHEREAS, CMP statute requires the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority ("MTA"), acting as the Congestion Management Agency for Los Angeles County, to annually determine that the County and cities within the County are conforming to all CMP requirements; and

WHEREAS, MTA requires submittal of the CMP Local Development Report by September 1 of each year; and

WHEREAS, the City Council held a noticed public hearing on August 13, 2013.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Lakewood does hereby resolve as follows:

SECTION 1. That the City has taken all of the following actions, and that the City is in conformance with all applicable requirements of the 2010 CMP adopted by the MTA Board on October 28, 2010.

By June 15, of odd-numbered years, the City will conduct annual traffic counts and calculate levels of service for selected arterial intersections, consistent with the requirements identified in the CMP Highway and Roadway System chapter.

The City has locally adopted and continues to implement a transportation demand management ordinance, consistent with the minimum requirements identified in the CMP Transportation Demand Management chapter.

The City has locally adopted and continues to implement a land use analysis program, consistent with the minimum requirements identified in the CMP Land Use Analysis Program chapter.

The City has adopted a Local Development Report, attached hereto and made a part hereof, consistent with the requirements identified in the 2010 CMP. This report balances traffic congestion impacts due to growth within the City with transportation improvements, and demonstrates that the City is meeting its responsibilities under the Countywide Deficiency Plan consistent with the MTA Board adopted 2003 Short Range Transportation Plan.

ORDINANCE NO. 2013-5

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAKEWOOD RELATING TO SIGNATURE AUTHORITY.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LAKEWOOD DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The following is hereby added as Chapter 10 in Article II of the Lakewood Municipal Code:

CHAPTER 10 SIGNATURE AUTHORITY

- **2950. SIGNATURE AUTHORITY.** Pursuant to the authority provided in Section 40602 of the California Government Code, the City shall be bound by the signatures of persons other than the Mayor in the following circumstances:
 - A. When the Mayor is unavailable the Vice Mayor may sign in lieu of the Mayor.
 - B. The City Manager or other person may sign when he or she is authorized to execute any item, by any action of the City Council.
 - C. Persons authorized to approve expenditures by the City's Purchasing Policy may execute any item necessary to effectuate the purposes of such Policy, up to each such person's dollar limits.
 - D. The City Attorney may sign items pertaining to legal matters, including but not limited to legal pleadings, settlement agreements and tolling agreements.

SECTION 2. The City Council hereby declares it would have passed this Ordinance sentence by sentence, paragraph by paragraph and section by section, and does hereby declare the provisions of this Ordinance are severable, and if for any reason any section of this Ordinance should be held invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining parts of this Ordinance.

SECTION 3. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby finds and determines there are no newspapers of general circulation both published and circulated within the City and, in compliance with Section 36933 of the Government Code, directs the City Clerk to cause said Ordinance within fifteen (15) days after its passage to be posted in at least three (3) public places within the City as established by Ordinance.

CalRecycle Grants for Beverage Container Recycling

INTRODUCTION

The State Department of Resources, Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) is accepting applications for the Beverage Container Recycling Grant Program. The purpose of the grant is to increase recycling of beverage containers and reduce the amount of beverage containers in the waste stream. The grant may be used for the purchase of materials such as recycling containers (but not trash cans), brochures, signage, personnel costs and public education and outreach, including promoting recycling at community events.

STATEMENT OF FACT

On July 17, 2013, city staff with the assistance of the city's solid waste consultant submitted a Beverage Container Recycling grant application to CalRecycle for the purchase of collection bins for use at city community events and for city meeting rooms at various park locations to recycle mixed beverage containers. The grants are anticipated to be awarded in December 2013. If successful, the City would use the grant funds beginning of January 2014 to purchase the additional recycling containers and engage in public education and outreach efforts.

FISCAL IMPACT

There are no matching fund requirements associated with the grant. Staff anticipates the submittal of the grant request of approximately \$55,400 for the purchase of recycling bins and outreach.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that City Council adopt the attached resolution authorizing the submittal of grant applications for beverage container recycling to CalRecycle for all grants for which the city is eligible.

The program offers a maximum of \$300,000 to public agencies and non-profit organizations within the fourth district to improve or develop trail-related projects. In order to apply for grant program funds, the City is required to submit a City Council approved resolution to the County of Los Angeles Regional Park and Open Space District.

SUBJECT: Authorize the Adoption of the Gateway Integrated Regional Water Management

Plan and Designation of New Board Members

INTRODUCTION

Over the past 18 months, the City of Lakewood with other cities, water agencies, and interested parties of the Los Angeles Gateway Region (Gateway Region), have developed an Integrated Regional Water Management Plan (IRWMP). These cities and agencies share water resources, have common water quality, water supply, or storm runoff problems and issues, and are demographically similar. These common traits provide a unique opportunity to jointly find integrated and coordinated solutions for the region's water-related issues through the IRWMP process. The Gateway Region formed a joint powers authority (JPA) in 2007 under California law to steer its planning efforts and provide solid governance for plan development and implementation.

There are currently 23 signatories to the JPA, and they are actively engaging in both stakeholder and public outreach programs and expanding JPA membership. The accompanying map displays the boundary of the Region and current cities that are participating in the JPA as well as those expected to join as the IRWMP development process progresses. The JPA is now known as the Gateway Water Management Authority (GWMA).

BACKGROUND

Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) is a collaborative effort to manage all aspects of water resources in a region. IRWM crosses jurisdictional, watershed, and political boundaries; involves multiple agencies, stakeholders, individuals, and groups; and attempts to address the issues and differing perspectives of all the entities involved through mutually beneficial solutions.

Decisions for the GWMA are made by GWMA member agency representatives. A Stakeholder Group was formed to provide recommendations to the GWMA on important decisions and to help guide the IRWMP process. Stakeholders include cities, water districts, water wholesalers and groundwater suppliers, wastewater agencies, watershed-based environmental advocates, watershed organizations, and State and Federal agencies. Special emphasis was employed in the outreach plan to provide disadvantaged communities to participate as stakeholders. Communication efforts were active, current, dependable, and provided an opportunity for a two-way dialog for all participants. Stakeholders compiled and finalized the Goals and Objectives of the IRWMP by consensus and then advanced the list to GWMA for final review and unanimous adoption on April 2012. Goals include:

- Protect and enhance water quality
- · Optimize and ensure water supply reliability, and
- Provide stewardship of the Region's water dependent natural resources through enhancement of amenities and infrastructure

To inform stakeholders of possible issues, the Consulting Team performed technical studies on groundwater and water quality, storm water and flooding, and water supply and demand for the Region. Those studies identified the location and extent of groundwater and flooding issues, suggested additional monitoring, recommended Best Management Practices (BMPs) for storm water issues and confirmed the Region's water supply was generally adequate through 2030.

Stakeholders were asked to suggest projects for the IRWMP that would meet the IRWMP goals. Projects were solicited beginning in late June 2012 and continuing until December. Seventy-three projects were collected, reviewed, and ranked by a Technical Review Team. The GWMA adopted the Project Review Criteria used to evaluate and rank projects as required by the IRWMP Guidelines. Fifteen of the 25 members of GWMA submitted project ideas for the IRWMP. The projects generally span the geographical extent of the Gateway Region and project types were generally well distributed, but water quality was the predominate project type. The final project ranking can be found in Appendix C of the IRWMP.

Several program "Alternatives" resulted from bundling complementing projects, including Systems Interties, Well Rehabilitation, Recycling and Conservation, Outfall Monitoring, Improving Catch Basins, Infrastructure Replacement, Groundwater Treatment, and Treatment of Low Flow Drainage. These programs were further advanced as regional projects and analyzed for benefits and impacts. The IRWMP also looked at compatibility and impacts of projects to neighboring IRWMP regions on Gateway projects.

The City of Lakewood submitted a proposed project for the installation of screens for all of the storm drain catch basins in the city. In Lakewood, there are over 1,000 catch basins that are owned by the city or the County of Los Angeles. Staff has proposed the use of two types of screens for each catch basin: Automatic Retractable Screens (ARS Units), which are installed on the curb opening of the catch basin, and Connector Pipe Screens (CPS Units), which are installed inside the catch basin to keep any debris that gets into the catch basin from going into the storm drain pipes. These units are approved for use by the County Flood Control District, and have previously been installed on many catch basins in the Los Angeles River Watershed via a multimillion dollar grant awarded years ago. Lakewood has these units installed on the two catch basins in Cherry Cove that flow to the LA River.

The total catch basin project cost is estimated at \$2,474,000, and we will likely need to provide a 25% match with local funds. Our request was packed together with 12 other cities for a total of \$5.34 million, and our request was the largest of all of the cities. GWMA submitted the catch basin project together with several other projects to the Department of Water Resources for the Prop 84 call for projects that was due at the end of March. We are likely to hear if we have been selected for funding in October. We have already been preparing for the project by using our college interns to inventory and measure our catch basins this summer, and are about 50% through our catch basin system.

The City of Lakewood approved joining the Los Angeles Gateway Region Integrated Water Management Authority and Joint Powers Authority on July 24, 2007. At that time, the Director of Water Resources (DWR) was appointed as the primary board member, with the Director of Public Works (DPW) appointed as the alternate. This arrangement was worked very well in the

intervening years while water supply issues were at the forefront. But more recently, the GWMA has been focusing on storm water and runoff water quality issues, which fall more under the responsibility of the DPW. The DPW has been attending all of the recent board meetings and watershed related meetings, and staff recommends that the Council revise the designation of the primary board member and alternate to the DPW and the public works Sr. Management Analyst. The Sr. Management Analyst is responsible for the City's environmental programs. The DPW will continue to involve the DWR in all matters relating to water supply. The proposed change in Board members is included in the recommendations below.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Gateway IRWMP is a regional planning document and does not obligate cities or districts to future expenditures. For a project to receive state grants or loans, the project must be included in the IRWMP and the sponsoring city must have formally adopted the IRWMP by resolution of its council. Agencies which are asking for funding from the Proposition 84 IRWM Implementation Grant Program, Round 2 must adopt the plan as soon as possible.



INTRODUCTION

STATEMENT OF FACTS

Each year since 9/11/2001, with a mixture of celebration and solemnity, it has become a Lakewood's commemoration of Patriot Day. Lakewood's commemoration of Patriot Day is displayed through the annual Patriot Day Concert held each year on September 11.
